#### **Course Objective**

The purpose of this course is to explore the foundations of microeconomic theory. We will focus on the behavior of individuals, firms, industries and other economic units and the interaction of these agents in the marketplace. The organization of markets and its implications for firm behavior will also be examined. The principles covered in this course are the building blocks of economic analysis. As you develop the necessary skills and progress in your economic studies, you will be able to put these skills into practice by examining concrete real world situations, ranging from firm pricing strategies to optimal government tax policies.

**<u>Required Text:</u>** *Microeconomics* by Robert S. Pindyck and Daniel L. Rubinfeld (8<sup>th</sup> edition).

Prerequisite: Introductory Economics (ECON 201).
